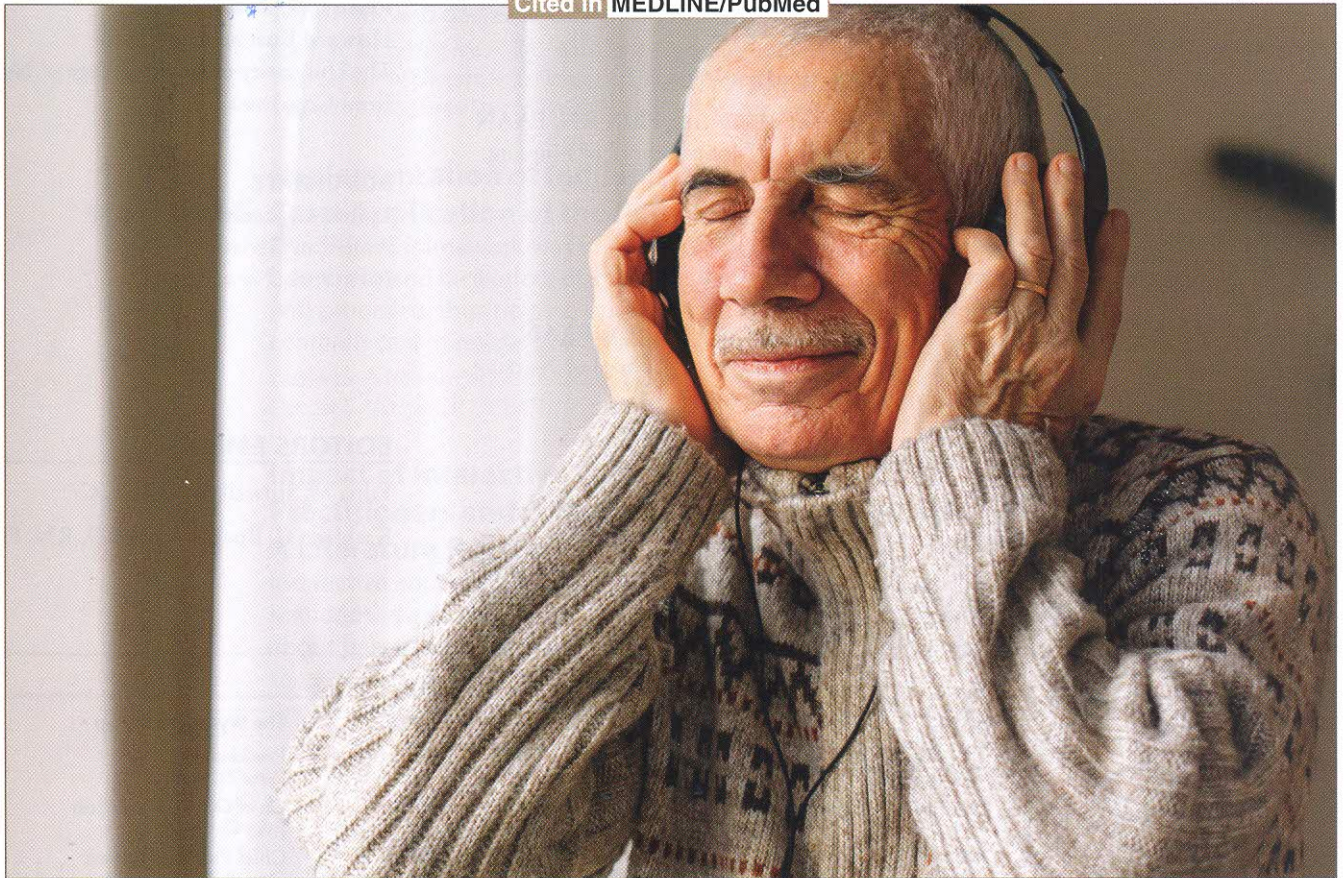

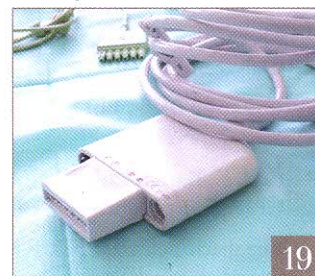
Interactive education, including role playing and web-based clinical scenarios, is a promising contemporary approach for raising awareness about best practice delirium care.

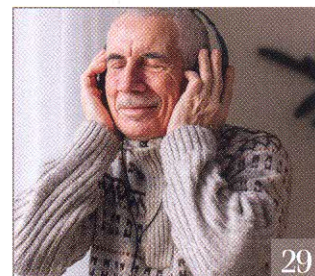

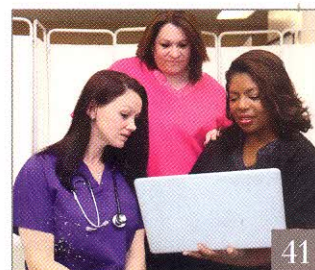
